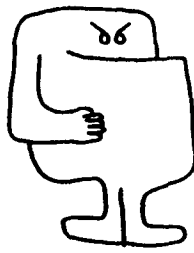

## Some Changes

Hello and welcome to the first issue of "The GLUMP", the newsletter of the Epsilon Zeta Alumni Association of Alpha Phi Omega. ## The 1984 Alpha Phi Omega National Convention

"Alpha Phi Omega: A Monument to Service" was the theme of the 1984 National Convention, which was held on December 28-30, 1984 in Washington, DC. Included here are the results of the legislation which affects alumni; a full report will appear in the next issue of "Torch and Trefoil".

### Bylaws changes

Life Members must renew their free subscription to "Torch and Trefoil" every five years.

The National Alumni Committee Chairman selects and the National President appoints the alumni members who serve on the National Alumni Committee.

The National Alumni Committee Chairman, who is one of the five Members-at-Large of the National Board of Directors, also serves as President of the National Alumni Association.

Alumni Associations must apply annually to the National Alumni Committee for formal recognition.

The National Alumni Committee may set a fee for formal recognition.

Alumni Associations which are composed neither of alumni members of a single Chapter nor of alumni members within a single geographical region must obtain the approval of the National Alumni Committee.

Members expelled from Alpha Phi Omega may not be granted membership in an Alumni Association.

The definition of an alumni member was clarified: alumni members are all former active, advisory, and honorary members.

### Resolutions

The National Fraternity supports Career Days, which allow alumni and undergraduates to talk about careers and so help the Brotherhood.

The National Fraternity recommends that each Chapter select an Alumni Secretary.

The National Fraternity encourages alumni members to take an active role in the reactivation of Chapters, under the guidance of the Regional Representatives.

The presentation of alumni awards shall be limited to one-half hour at the Opening Banquet at National Conventions.

In order to be formally recognized, a petitioning Alumni Association must submit a set of bylaws, the names and contact information of its officers, and a roster of petitioning members. Formal recognition entitles the Alumni Association to a letter of recognition, the use of a name which may include "Alpha Phi Omega" but which may not include "Chapter", and the use of the name "Alpha Phi Omega" to apply for separate tax-exempt status. The National Fraternity and the Chapter, if any, for which the Alumni Association is named, assume no liability for the Alumni Association.

The Toast Song remains unchanged; however, an addition to the Pledge Manual will state that "men", like "Brother" and "Fraternity", is interpreted by the National Fraternity to include both men and women.

The 1986 National Convention will be held in Houston, Texas on December 28-30, 1986.

The National Officers are: Earle Herbert (President), Stan Carpenter (Vice President), Abe Frishman (Member-at-Large, Alumni), Fred Pollack (Member-at-Large, Leadership Development), Mike Suhr (Member-at-Large, Finance), Jerry Schroeder (Member-at-Large, Membership and Extension), and Berkeley Duncan (Member-at-Large, Service).

### Nobody Does It Better

At the 1984 Alpha Phi Omega National Convention, Epsilon Zeta Chapter received the M. R. Disborough Service to Scouting Award. The Brothers had barely gotten over the excitement of having won the Award when Stan Carpenter, National Service Chairman, said of the Chapter which had won the Arno "Shorty" Nowotny National Service Award, "Nobody does it better," and presented the Award to Epsilon Zeta Chapter. EZ has won the Nowotny Award twice out of the last three times, and is the first Chapter to have won the Award a second time. The Epsilon Zeta Alumni Association extends hearty congratulations to Epsilon Zeta Chapter, and to the Brothers, both Active and Alumni, who helped make our Chapter's service program the best in the land during the past two years.

Now, some notes:

Our Association currently has \$712.72 in its account. Much of this will be spent on postage for the newsletters, which are being mailed first class so that they will be forwarded to you when you move, and so that you will receive them in days rather than weeks. How much will this cost us? I'm glad you asked. We will be sending out two newsletters to approximately 700 people, so the postage will cost \$280.00 plus the extra charges for those which must be mailed to foreign countries. Last year, we sent out 3 newsletters to approximately 650 people, so the postage cost \$101.40 plus the extra charges for mailing to foreign countries. We will be publishing our directory soon, which will cost about \$200.00.
