The books for the 1994 Fiscal Year have been closed out. A complete record was presented in February's newsletter and at the ECOM meeting. To summarize quickly, the EZAA closed the fiscal year (1/94 to 12/94) with an checking account balance of \$1153.57. This was the result of dues and generous donations from over 86 members. My thanks to one and all!

The current fiscal year is going well, but there are a few problems. So far only fifty seven member have registered for this year (FY95) - not as strong as last year. Our problems from pre-1994 have not been resolved and are still with us. In addition, the 50th Anniversary is coming up which will put a strong drain on our treasury (the banquet hall deposit alone will run about a \$1000).
